

RESOLUTION TITLE: TO AMEND GRANT PROJECT ORDINANCE 2021-264 FOR THE GASTON COUNTY CORONAVIRUS STATE AND LOCAL FISCAL RECOVERY FUNDS

WHEREAS, pursuant to Section 13.2 of Chapter 159 of the General Statutes of North Carolina, the Gaston County Grant Project Ordinance 2021-264 for the Gaston County Coronavirus State and Local Fiscal Recovery Funds was adopted in Regular Session by the Gaston County Board of Commissioners on September 28, 2021; and,

WHEREAS, the Gaston County Board of Commissioners shall amend Section 2 of the Grant Project Ordinance to authorize appropriations for specific programs, services, projects, and activities. The Board may also appropriate some or all of these funds to an enterprise fund in an annual budget ordinance for a water, wastewater, or stormwater infrastructure project.

BE IT ORDAINED by the County Commissioners of Gaston County, North Carolina, pursuant to Section 13.2 of Chapter 159 of the General Statutes of North Carolina, that:

Section 1: This ordinance is to establish a budget for a project to be funded by the Coronavirus State and Local Fiscal Recovery Funds of H.R. 1319 American Rescue Plan Act of 2021 (CSLRF). Gaston County has received the first tranche in the amount of \$21,806,063 of CSLRF funds. The total allocation is \$43,612,126, with the remainder to be distributed to the County within 12 months. These funds may be used for the following categories of expenditures, to the extent authorized by state law.

- 1. Support public health expenditures, by funding COVID-19 mitigation efforts, medical expenses, behavioral healthcare, and certain public health and safety staff
- 2. Address negative economic impacts caused by the public health emergency, including economic harms to workers, households, small businesses, impacted industries, and the public sector
- 3. Replace lost public sector revenue, using this funding to provide government services to the extent of the reduction in revenue experienced due to the pandemic
- 4. Provide premium pay for essential workers, offering additional support to those who have borne and will bear the greatest health risks because of their service in critical infrastructure sectors
- 5. Invest in water, sewer, and broadband infrastructure, making necessary investments to improve access to clean drinking water, support vital wastewater and stormwater infrastructure, and to expand access to broadband internet.

In accordance with N.C.G.S. 143-64.31 and following Gaston County's Uniform Guidance Policy and Procedures, an RFQ for Professional Architecture/Engineering Design Services was advertised January 2022, and a selection will be made by February 28, 2022. The project will be taken to the Board, as directed, March 22, 2022. If scope and fee negotiations are successful, A/E Firm will be given NTP in April. Project design could take up to 9 months depending on possible right of way acquisition, and coordination with Two Rivers Utilities. An Agreement will be executed between Gaston County and Mt. Holly. Gaston County will be the lead agency on the project. Right of Way acquisition, permitting and Construction could take 12 months.

The County does have the authority to construct water infrastructure, but the County's Attorney will need to verify if NCGS 160A, Article 16 and NCGS 153A, Article 15 are the correct statutes.

Link to COVID-19

Stay at home orders and business shutdowns stemming from the early outbreak of COVID have made health, hygiene, and safety a more obvious priority. Residential water usage has increa vulnerable households still lack reliable access to water. Unexpected events from droughts to floods, and social disruptions like COVID, have highlighted the need to botser the reliability, resilience and sustainability of the water system in this area to provide critical water services under more variable and uncertain conditions. The threat of ground water depletion is more present since the pandemic, and the associated increased residential water usage. Protecting the ground water dependent ecosystems should be considered. This project will provide the community that maintains their own water supply with a protective action for future disruptions and help preserve the natural ecosystem.

There are numerous private and community wells in the vicinity of the park. Gaston County continually has difficulty providing adequate, clean drinking water for the park due to ground water and well issues. The Drinking water well at the park has been replaced due to low flow and water quality. There are no available areas for future wells, so an established and consistent waterline source needs to be provided. This project will enable and ensure the park and surrounding area to have access to adequate, safe, and reliable drinking water source.

North Belmont Park is adjacent to 2022 Qualified Census Tract 310.01 that has a diversity index of 47. The diversity index has increased from 23 since 2010. The park is within 2 miles of East Gaston High School where 35% of the students are considered disadvantaged. The park is within 2 miles of North Belmont Elementary School. North Belmont Elementary School is a Title 1 School, with 44.3% of the students considered disadvantaged.

Mount Holly will be able to share data in their annual Drinking Water Report.

County Environmental Health will have data relative to monitoring the wells in the area for contaminations and low flow.

The pandemic reminded us that far too many Americans, disproportionately low-income people and people of color, lack the essential components of healthy communities: affordable healthcare, safe parks, clean air and safe drinking water to name a few. Underserved populations and neighborhoods may have the greatest pandemic recovery needs. Funding this waterline project will deliver safe and affordable water to a vulnerable community and their community park.

Special Considerations

COVID-19 has reinforced the importance of access to safe and reliable water. With Grant funding, and partnership with Mt. Holly, the community would benefit from the water service provided by the proposed line, but also Mt Holly's future CIP waterline serving even more citizens, could be completed in the area.



The County does have the authority to construct water infrastructure, but the County's Attorney will need to verify if NCGS 160A, Article 16 and NCGS 153A, Article 15 are the correct statutes.

Since the early outbreak of COVID, health, hyglene, and safety have become more obvious priorities. Hand washing as a tool to slow the spread of the virus has reinforced the importance of access to safe and reliable water at Lowell Elementary.

Statement of Need

Lowell Elementary School currently receives water from McAdenville/Two Rivers Utilities. The existing dead-end line is a 2" line. It has been found that the old line is corroding, and water quality and water pressure is being compromised due to age of current infrastructure. The line needs to be replaced. The School is 1500 feet from the last customer on the line. McAdenville does not receive enough revenue from this line to justify the replacement or repair of the line. Lowell cannot monitor the water from McAdenville or make repairs efficiently if there is a problem. Therefore Lowell would like to supply their Elementary School with their known, reliable clean water source.

Population Served

Lowell Elementary is a Title 1 school that serves 485 students. 60.1% are considered Economically Disadvantaged. The school is located adjacent to QCT 310.01, where the diversity index is 47.

Results

Gaston School should be able to compare operations/maintenance costs before and after the waterline extension to Lowell

Evaluation

If the water is provided by Lowell, they will be able to provide data from their annual drinking water quality report as well as any new connections made to the constructed system and the revenue they collect.

Equity Impact

Funding this waterline project will deliver safe and affordable water to a vulnerable community and the elementary school that serves it.





The Chapet Grove Community, along with Chapet Grove Elementary School, is currently served by groundwater wells or community well systems extracting drinking water from the groundwater table. Per the City of Gastonia's Southwest Plan, Two Rivers Utilities may not address this area's need for public water until 2040-2050 CIP Budget. Past droughts have resulted in a shortage of sufficient drinking water and, subsequently, many drinking wells have low pressure or have gone dry. In addition, the elementary school serving this community does not currently have a municipal source of water for reliable clean water. Currently the school tests the drinking water for contaminants daily. In this project area, there are three known or previously known contamination sites. The safety and quality of private well water is the responsibility of the owners. If there is a Duke Energy power outage in the community, the well pumps will not function, and the school, businesses and residents will be without water.

Population Served

The project will serve portions of the 2022 Census Tracts 317.04 (Diversity Index 40, which has increased by 12 since 2010) and 317.03 (Diversity Index 64, up by 17 since 2010), adjacent to the Qualified Census Tract 332.04. Chapel Grove Elementary School is a Title I school, located in Census Tract 317.04 in Gaston County. 80% of this census tract is white (down 11% from 2010), and 9% black (up 31% from 2010). Chapel Grove Elementary School is part of Gaston County Public Schools in Gastonia, N.C. and serves approximately 430 children in grades PK-5. 52.6% of the students are considered are economically disadvantaged. Census Tract 317.04 was considered a QCT in 2021. The total population of 3,681 has dropped 0.2% since 2010.

The US Census Bureau reports that the Median Household Income for Gaston County is \$56,595. The 2021 Median Family Income for tract 317.04 is \$58,075. This is considered slightly higher than moderate income.

Results

Gaston County Environmental Health reports that here are numerous private wells in the area within a 1-mile radius of Chapel Grove Elementary School. The subdivisions along Lewis Road and Chapel Grove Rd are served by up to eight community wells. The private wells, that serve 1 or 2 houses, do not have to meet state or federal drinking water standards and are not required to be sampled except at the time of installation. Community wells are sampled on a regular basis and are required to be chlorinated and meet state and federal drinking water standards. In this same area, there are three known or previously known contamination sites, Gaston County will partner with Two Rivers Utilities to waive tap fees and educate residents on public water. Master meters may be installed for the residents on community wells. Historically, community well water rates are higher than Two Rivers' rates.

Evaluation

Two Rivers Utilities will be able to provide data in their annual drinking water quality report as well as any connections made to the constructed system and the revenue they collect. Gaston Schools can provide current contamination data for comparison. County Environmental Health will have data relative to monitoring the wells in the area for contaminations. A Performance Target in the County's Strategic Plan directs staff to develop a method of analysis reflecting the number of projects and miles of water and sewer extensions funded by the County and its stakeholders

The pandemic reminded us that far too many Americans, disproportionately low-income people and people of color, lack the essential components of healthy communities: affordable healthcare, safe parks, clean air and safe drinking water to name a few. Underserved populations and neighborhoods may have the greatest pandemic recovery needs. Of the 29 public elementary schools in Gaston County, Chapel Grove Elementary and one other elementary school is served by well water. Funding this waterline project will deliver safe and affordable water to a vulnerable community and the elementary school that serves it.

Gaston County will pursue an Agreement with Two Rivers, and Gaston Schools to partner in a successful project that provides the community with safe clean drinking water.

Currently there are 3 full time project coordinators. Cary Rodríguez has 20+ years of Local government Project management experience and will be managing the project from design through construction and close out. She is dedicated to managing projects with Federal Funding and works closely with Finance to ensure proper monitoring and reporting is achieved. Her experience with federal funds to date includes CMAQ projects and FTA projects.

Special Considerations

COVID-19 has reinforced the importance of access to safe and reliable water. With Grant funding, and partnerships with Gaston County Schools and Two Rivers Utilities, the County can prioritize addressing the lack of infrastructure in disadvantaged areas. COVID related impacts on residential water usage may begin to reach pre-COVID levels, but there could be long term impacts if more people continue to work from home, or unemployment remains high.

The Department of Treasury Compliance & Reporting Guidance Part 1, C.2.d Investments in Water Sewer and Broadband indicates that recipients may use SLFRF award funds to cover costs incurred for eligible projects planned or started prior to March 3, 2021, provided that the project costs covered by SLFRF award funds are incurred after March 3, 2021. Furthermore, Part 1 D.8 directs recipients to follow Uniform Guidance at 2 CFR 200.317 through 2 CFR 200.327.

The EPA Drinking Water State Revolving Fund (DWSRF) Eligibility Handbook identifies six broad categories of eligible projects. This project falls under Category 2 - Transmission and Distribution: New water main extensions to serve existing residents not served by a safe supply of potable water (this includes installation of the service line up to premise plumbing). THE DWSRF also states that "Eligible costs include actual pre-construction (planning and design, including costs

associated with obtaining project authorization and issuance/execution of the loan) and construction costs that are directly associated with the project and issuance of the loan." And, "Costs for acquiring land are eligible only if the land is needed to locate eligible project components and the land is acquired from a willing seller."

Gaston County's average household size is 2.6, with a Federal Poverty Guideline of \$18,810.



In accordance with N.C.G.S. 143-64.31 and following Gaston County's Uniform Guidance Policy and Procedures, an RFQ for Professional Architecture/Engineering Design Services was advertised January 2022, and a selection will be made by February 28, 2022. The project will be taken to the Board, as directed, March 22, 2022. A/E Firm will be given NTP as directed by the Board in April 2022. Project design could take up to 12 months depending on possible right of way acquisition, and coordination based upon the preferred alternative. An Agreement will be executed between Gaston County and the water service provider. Gaston County will be the lead agency on the project. Right of Way acquisition, permitting and Construction could take 12+ months.

Please explain both the NC state and federal legal authority to undertake this program

The County does have the authority to construct water infrastructure, but the County's Attorney will need to verify if NCGS 160A, Article 16 and NCGS 153A, Article 15 are the correct statutes.

Stay at home orders and business shutdowns stemming from the early outbreak of COVID have made health, hygiene, and safety a more obvious priority. Residential water usage has increased. However, vulnerable households still lack reliable access to water. Unexpected events from droughts to floods, and social disruptions like COVID, have highlighted the need to bolster the reliability, resilience and sustainability of the water system in this area to provide critical water services under more variable and uncertain conditions. The threat of ground water depletion is more present since the pandemic, and the associated increased residential water usage. Protecting the ground water dependent ecosystems should be considered. This project will provide the community that maintains their own water supply with a protective action for future disruptions and help preserve the natural ecosystem.

County Environmental Health will have data relative to monitoring the wells in the area for contaminations. Cherryville or Bessemer City will also be able to provide information depending on where the water comes from.

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



BACKGROUND

The American Rescue Plan (ARP) Act of 2021 created new Coronavirus State and Local Fiscal Recovery Funds. The Act sets aside \$65.1 billion to be allocated to counties based on population and sent directly from the Department of Treasury. Gaston County is expected to receive \$43,612,126 million over two years. Pursuant to Section 13. 2 of Chapter 159 of the General Statutes of North Carolina, the Gaston County Grant Project Ordinance 2021- 264 for the Gaston County Coronavirus State and Local Fiscal Recovery Funds was adopted in Regular Session by the Gaston County Board of Commissioners on September 28, 2021. This Board Action, if approved, amends Section 2 of the Gaston County ARPA Grant Project Ordinance and accepts and appropriates funds for the following project:

1. Grants Manager Position - Budget Amendment (\$33,341): This project/position was originally approved by the Board 12/14/2021. This amendment is to revise the budget to adjust for salary and benefits for the position and to add operating expenditures lines for administering the grant.
