The Gaston County Board of Commissioners (BOC) met in Regular Session on October 23, 2018 at 6:00 pm in The Harley B. Gaston, Jr. Public Forum, Gaston County Courthouse.

Chairman Chad Brown presided with Commissioners Tom Keigher, Vice-Chairman; Jack B. Brown, Bob Hovis, Tracy L. Philbeck and Ronnie Worley in attendance.

Commissioner Allen R. Fraley was not in attendance.

Others present included Earl Mathers, County Manager; Charles L. Moore, County Attorney; and Donna S. Buff, Clerk to the Board.

Upon request of Chairman Brown, Commissioner Hovis led those assembled in the Invocation and Commissioner Keigher led in the Pledge of Allegiance.

Judge William Gaston Award Presentation

Vice-Chairman Keigher presented:

- A very important part of this Board's mission is to encourage citizen participation in county government and community involvement.
- In 1998, the County Commission established an annual award bearing the name of the County's namesake, Judge William
 Gaston (1778-1844), to recognize those volunteers who have demonstrated exemplary commitment, dedication, and
 leadership. Since its establishment, the County Commission has honored 61 recipient volunteers for their services to the
 Gaston County community.
- This year the Board of Commissioners has the privilege of presenting the William Gaston Award to one outstanding individual: Dr. Edward Smith
- At this time, I would ask Dr. Edward Smith to come to the podium along with any family and friends he has with him to receive the William Gaston Award.

Dr. Edward Smith

Chairman Brown presented:

- Dr. Edward "Ed" Smith has been described by his colleagues as "humble, personable and approachable a highly distinguished and motivated public servant who has devoted many years to serving Gaston County and its citizens".
- An advocate for community health and wellness for all citizens, Ed is currently the Vice-Chairman of the Gaston County Health
 and Human Services Board and he also serves as the Chairman of the Sub-Committee on Abuse and Neglect.
- Likewise, Ed works passionately on behalf of Gaston County's aging community. He is currently the Chairman of the Gaston County Council on Aging a board that works on behalf of older adults to provide and coordinate services to keep older adults living independently. He is also a member of the Adult Care Home Community Advisory Committee of the North Carolina Long Term Care Ombudsman Program that promotes community involvement and cooperation with adult care homes and nursing homes to ensure the quality of care for older and disabled adults.
- Ed has been a part of the Gaston County community for more than 27 years. He is known as a passionate supporter of education initiatives and he understands that a strong, skilled workforce is vital to Gaston County's economy. Involved in education and workforce development for most of his career, Ed has served in many different capacities. He was the Vice President for Workforce Development for the Gaston Regional Chamber of Commerce from 2008 to 2011. He was also the Vice President for Workforce Development and Continuing Education for Tri-County Community College; the Dean of Continuing Education and Summer School at Lees McRae College and the Dean of Continuing Education and Summer School for Belmont Abbey College from 1991 to 1997. Most recently, Ed worked for Montreat College serving as the Director for the Charlotte, Asheville and Morganton campuses until his retirement in 2014.
- Ed, the County Commission extends its gratitude to you and your devoted wife Debra. We are forever indebted to you for your
 exemplary leadership, kindness and compassion and for your many years of service to the citizens of Gaston County.
- Your willingness to serve is truly inspirational, and as a colleague recently stated, your "tireless work and passion is the
 embodiment of a public servant and of this distinguished award".
- On behalf of the County Commission, it is my pleasure to present you with the William Gaston Award.

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Chairman Brown stated that during his eight years on the Board Dr. Smith has been an outstanding person and mentor and it was his pleasure to nominate him as a recipient for this year's Award.

Dr. Smith accepted and thanked the Board for the Award and for the opportunity to serve the residents of the County.

<u>Commendation - Commissioner Hovis - BOC - Certificate of Commendation - To Commend Captain Robert Heussy, Union Road Volunteer Fire Department, Recipient of the 2018 Workwear MVP Award</u>

Commissioner Hovis invited Captain Robert Heussy, his family and friends to join him at the podium and advised as follows:

- Captain Robert Heussy was nominated for an MVP award through Service Wear Apparel Company a few months ago.
- Robert has been a member of Union Road VFD for 13 years and was nominated for his work through his ministry, Fireman's Faith. Robert uses Fireman's Faith to minister to firefighters throughout our area and in countries such as Nicaragua and Honduras. He has been on several mission trips where he has ministered to firefighters that may not have known Christ. Robert also collects fire equipment that is no longer being used here in the states and ships it to fire departments such as those in Honduras and Nicaragua. He does this on monies he has raised, but mostly from money out of his own pocket.
- Service Wear Apparel has a contest each year that recognizes someone that goes above and beyond. The winner is chosen
 through a comprehensive selection and voting process. This year, Robert won overwhelmingly. The award ceremony was held
 on September 13, 2018 at Sandy Plains Baptist Church on Union Road. Robert was presented with a check for \$1,000 and the
 Union Road VFD was awarded \$1,000 worth of uniforms.

Commissioner Hovis presented him with the following Certificate of Commendation:

Upon being named the Recipient of the 2018 Workwear MVP Award, presented by Service Wear Apparel Company, for his dedicated ministry to fellow firefighters through Fireman's Faith. The Gaston County Board of Commissioners further commends him for his faithfulness and tireless Service to the Union Road community. His service and dedication proudly reflects the highest ideals of himself, the members of his team and all fellow firefighters.

Commissioner Hovis stated that Captain Huessy is the example we hope all firefighters in Gaston County uphold and we are proud to have him as a part of our Gaston County family.

<u>Presentation of the LGFCU Excellence in Innovations Award to Gaston County DHHS Children and Family Services</u>

Chairman Brown introduced Mr. Matt Gunnet with the North Carolina Association of County Commissioners (NCACC), and Ms. LeeAnna Lott with the Local Government Federal Credit Union (LGFCU) and invited the DHHS staff to the podium.

Mr. Matt Gunnet, NCACC Membership Services Coordinator, advised the NCACC supports and promotes the wellbeing of its 100 NC counties and empowers them through advocacy, education, research and member services to work together for the betterment of one state. He thanked the BOC for their work on their legislative goals, Chairman Brown for his leadership, and

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Commissioner Keigher for serving on their Health and Human Services Steering Committee and for being a longtime Board of Directors District Director. He thanked Ms. Marcie Smith, Solid Waste and Recycling Administrator, for being a member of their Environment Steering Committee.

Mr. Gunnet noted that Mr. Ralph Ketner, a Rowan County native and co-founder of Food Town known now as Food Lion started the Employee Productivity Awards in 1991 and its sponsorship was taken over by the LGFCU. He introduced Ms. LeeAnna Lott for comments.

Ms. LeeAnna Lott, LGFCU Membership Development Officer, advised the LGFCU President (Mark Caverly) and CEO (Maurice Smith) took over sponsorship of the award which was renamed the *LGFCU Excellence and Innovation Awards*; in addition to monetary awards the LGFCU holds an awards luncheon at the NCACC Annual Conference to recognize award winners, present trophies to winning programs and share the innovative ideas with all 100 counties.

Mr. Gunnett advised ten awards were given in four categories (General Government; Human Services; Public Information; Participation and Intergovernmental Collaboration); he described the panel of judges and he outlined the selection criteria. There were 38 submissions in 2018; Gaston County Department of Social Services was awarded for developing and implementing their Day Maker Program (General Government Category) – a program that allows the community to support children via donations from 363 people resulting in 765 gifts for foster children between March and December 2017; the value of those gifts was over \$12,000. Program team members include Melanie Lowrance (Children & Family Services Administrator), Tara Joyner and Tiyiania Shands (Foster Program Coordinators) and Brittany Swift (Social Services Assistant). He introduced Ms. Shands to comment on the program.

Ms. Shands thanked the NCACC and the LGFCU for the Innovations Award; advised that with the Day Maker Program, the community can choose children to sponsor and purchase Christmas and birthday gifts; last year the program helped more than 192 children with donations of more than \$12,000.

Mr. Gunnet and Ms. Lott presented a \$1,000 check to Gaston County for the Day Maker Program.

Public Hearing - Zoning Map Change: (Z18-09) Taylor Davis (Applicant); Property Parcel: 139199, Located between E Hudson Blvd. and Neal Hawkins Rd., Rezone from the (CD/RMF) Conditional District / Residential Multi Family Zoning District to the (RMF) Residential Multi Family Zoning District

Chairman Brown announced the Public Hearings as advertised; explained procedures to be used; called for the motion to enter into Public Hearings.

On motion introduced by Commissioner Worley and seconded by Commissioner Keigher, the BOC unanimously entered into Public Hearings.

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With a quorum of the Planning Board in attendance, Chairman Brown recognized Mr. Willie King, Community Development Planner III, for comments.

Mr. King restated the request as outlined above and advised it involved rezoning one parcel from the Conditional District/Residential Multi Family Zoning District (CD/RMF) to the Residential Multi Family Zoning District (RMF); the Applicant and his representative were present; subject property is 27+/- acres, wooded and undeveloped. He reviewed the aerial map depicting the property's location (southeastern part of County's jurisdiction - Hudson Blvd. to the north, Neil Hawkins Rd. to the south and Hwy 321 to west); current CD/RMF zoning, surrounding zoning, street network, jurisdictions and the adjacent properties that were notified about hearing. He further advised that the property is located within the Suburban Development Area (Planning Area Four); is staff's opinion that the request is consistent with the Comprehensive Land Use Plan based on the goals, objectives and zoning district pattern in the overall area; the hearing was advertised and notices were mailed per County policy; staff received one call and one walk-in for general information about the application.

Chairman Brown called for citizen comment.

Attorney David Smith, representative for the applicant, advised that Mr. Joseph Cass, the Developer's representative (also present) is well versed and experienced in developing multifamily projects; the property is currently owned by C&C Investments and Ratchford Family Partnership; Mr. Donnie Cann and John Cashatt were present on behalf of the owners. Formerly, the subject property was within the City of Gastonia's ETJ; this request involves taking it from a conditional use district to a straight RMF rezoning district for multifamily purposes; the property was under the City's permit in the 1990s which has expired; the Developer wants to bring it within the County's RMF zone and develop it per the Unified Development Ordinance (UDO) with the applicable supplemental regulations that are already in place; currently there is no specific plan for the property.

Pastor John Pelonero, 631 Efird St., Gastonia, NC advised that the previous landowners gave New Covenant Church permission to keep its sign on the corner parcel; the Church wants to be in good standing with the new owners and for Hudson Blvd. to be developed in a good neighborly fashion so it can reach and serve as many people as possible.

Chairman Brown called for questions from the Planning Board; hearing none, called for questions from the BOC.

Commissioner Worley asked if there would be multiple points of ingress and egress since the property is bordered by Hudson Blvd. and Neal Hawkins Rd.

Mr. Joseph Cass, 227 Asbury Ave., Greenville, SC advised the Developer is just getting into the preliminary site design; NC-DOT wants Developer to use the existing curb cut across from Efird St. for ingress and egress; currently there are no plans to connect to Neal Hawkins Rd.

Commissioner Worley asked how many units would be on the property.

Mr. Cass responded that Phase 1 would have 80 units for the acreage.

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Hearing no further questions, Chairman Brown moved to the next item of business.

Public Hearing - Zoning Map Change: (Z18-10) Shelia H. Ballard (Applicant); Property Parcels: 220416 and 165013, Located at 350 and 344 Ballard Rd., Rezone from the (R-1) Single Family Limited Zoning District to the (R-3) Single Family General Zoning District

Chairman Brown introduced Mr. King for comments.

Mr. King advised subject request involved rezoning two parcels from the R-1 (Single Family Limited Zoning District) to the R-3 (Single Family Moderate Zoning District); Applicant, Ms. Sheila Ballard (present). The original maps in the Planning Board and BOC packets were amended because of a discrepancy with the rear portion of the larger parcel (220416); the Mapping Department verified that corrections were in order after careful remapping and deed research; the acreage proposed for rezoning has been reduced from 29.42 to 24.41 acres. He distributed the amended maps to the BOC.

On motion introduced by Commissioner Chad Brown and seconded by Commissioner Keigher, the BOC accepted the revised map to be entered as part of the record.

Mr. King further advised the larger parcel (220416) contains one residential structure and undeveloped land; the second parcel (165013) contains an unoccupied residential structure. Mr. King reviewed aerial and zoning maps depicting the property's location in the northeastern area (between Stanley, Alexis and High Shoals), the R-1 and R-2 area zoning, surrounding street network and adjacent landowners, which were notified of the proposed map amendment and hearing; advised the property is located within a Rural Area of Planning Area Three; based on the goals, objectives and zoning district pattern in the overall vicinity, it is staff's opinion the request is consistent with the Comprehensive Land Use Plan; the request was advertised and notices were mailed out per County policy; staff received one call and one walk-in for general information.

Chairman Brown called for citizen comments.

Ms. Sheila Ballard, Applicant, PO Box J, Catawba, NC advised her parents owned the property at 350 Ballard Rd., Dallas, NC; her mother died last year and as Executor of the estate; trying to get the property rezoned so her brother can put a mobile home on it.

Mr. Michael Skulkety, 432 Ballard Rd., Dallas, NC advised Ballard Rd. is graveled and Statemaintained; he does not have a problem having one mobile home on the property but the State should pave the road first because it is a mess in the winter; prefers R-1 not R-3 zoning.

Mr. Caleb Cook, 474 Ballard Rd., Dallas, NC asked why the entire parcel needed to be rezoned for one trailer, and what made the zoning go from R-1 to R-3 instead of R-2 like the surrounding areas.

Chairman Brown advised those questions would be answered as the meeting progressed.

Chairman Brown called for questions from the Planning Board; hearing none, called for questions from the BOC.

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Commissioner Philbeck asked why the zoning district was being changed to R-3.

Mr. King responded the R-3 district allows stick-built, site built, modular, doublewide, and singe-wide homes and manufactured homes.

Commissioner Philbeck advised the neighbors do not want a mobile home park; asked if any additional mobile homes would have to come before BOC?

Mr. King responded if Applicant was doing a subdivision the Ordinance allows three parcels at a 3-acre minimum by right; anything beyond that must be examined by staff.

Commissioner Philbeck asked if Applicant could put a mobile home on every three acres by right.

Mr. King advised it would be a maximum of three lots at three acres.

Mr. David Williams, Planning & Development Services Director, explained that per Code you can only have one single family residential on a piece of property; having more than one would require subdividing the property; if that occurred the Subdivision Ordinance only allows *not more than three* 3-acre tracts off Ballard Rd; if Applicant has already done one or two they could not do any additional ones; staff would have to examine that in-house; that changed in 2008 per the UDO.

Commissioner Philbeck asked if a Conditional Use Permit (CUP) would better serve the Applicant.

Mr. Williams advised that the Applicant can apply for a Parallel Conditional Use Permit (PCUP) and submit a site plan for a single family residential meeting the required setbacks, etc. if the rezoning request is denied.

Commissioner Philbeck started he personally did not have an issue with having a trailer on the property; would like BOC to consider if Applicant considers doing anything else that could potentially create an ingress/egress issue.

Mr. Williams advised Applicant has only applied for one tract.

Commissioner Hovis stated the Subdivision Ordinance applied to the original tract and if it had been subdivided once into two tracts the Applicant could do another tract by right under R-3 without the Subdivision Ordinance requirement; if Applicant chose to do more, the Subdivision Ordinance requirements would apply which would be expensive and prohibitive; do not foresee the original size property being subdivided by an individual – maybe by a developer at some point in time, but that would be expensive – especially since the road is not paved per State standards; Public Works advised it would take more than \$15M to pave the numerous roads in Gaston County that do not meet State standards; asked if there could be a PCUP requirement that allowed a mobile home use in an R-1.

Mr. King advised that staff offered that option to Applicant; R-1 does not allow manufacturing houses.

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Commissioner Hovis advised a PCUP would not address the need in its current zoning district.

Commissioner Jack Brown asked if County previously restricted removing a mobile home and replacing it with another one.

Mr. King advised that may have been the grandfathered policy; today it is a legal non-conformity and that policy is still in place which applies to manufactured houses and other structures.

Chairman Brown asked if the Applicant owned the parcel reduced from 29 to 24 acres that extended back to Rhyne Road.

Mr. King responded "no".

Hearing no other questions, Chairman Brown moved to the next item of business.

Public Hearing - Zoning Text Amendment: (ZTA 18-02) Applicant: Gaston County Planning Board - To Consider Proposed Text Amendments to the Unified Development Ordinance (UDO), Chapter 2 (Definitions) Table 2.7-1; Chapter 6 (Zoning Districts) Section 6.2.1(G); Chapter 7 (Uses and Building Lot Standards) Table 7.1-1; Chapter 8 (Supplemental Regulations) Sections 8.1.17(J) and 8.4.29; Chapter 10 (Parking Regulations) Section 10.12(B)2-3; Chapter 13 (Subdivision Regulations) Sections 13.11(D)3(w) and 13.28.1; Chapter 15 (Water Supply Watershed Regulations) Section 15.9.1(A)

Chairman Brown introduced Mr. David Williams, Planning & Development Services Director, for comments.

Mr. Williams advised subject text amendments reflects minor clarification of existing definitions, existing uses, changes in state statutes for plat submittal and the inclusion of the watershed; both Boards were provided with the proposed changes as highlighted and italicized in their packets; proposed amendments affect Chapters 2, 6, 7, 8, 10, 13 and 15; the Planning Board reviewed the proposed text amendments and unanimously recommended them for public hearing.

Chairman Brown called for citizen comment and for questions from the Planning Board; hearing none, called for questions from the BOC.

Commissioner Philbeck referenced the term, *Junkyard and Salvage Yard - Definition*; asked why staff was deleting "...The use of more than five hundred (500) square feet of the area of any lot...".

Mr. Williams responded to update the junkyard actual use; Planning Board and staff had concerns about having no zoning regulations on a junkyard less than 500SF; the County can zone and regulate the actual business by deleting that text; the solid waste scrap metal and junk that is not part of a business is regulated by the Solid Waste Ordinance.

Commissioner Philbeck referenced ... "used plumbing fixtures and used brick, wood, or other building materials"...; asked if a farm with a lot of wood on it or acreage used to store wood from cutting down trees, would be deemed a junkyard.

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Mr. Williams responded that the definition is related to a business activity; if someone is trying to run an operation that discarded that type of material, it would need to be controlled through zoning.

Chairman Brown referenced **Section 10-12, Parking and Storage of Boats and of Recreational Vehicles, B., 2**; asked why it changed from "rear" to "front" or why not have rear and front.

Mr. Williams advised currently recreational vehicles (RVs) are only allowed in the rear yard; this will allow RVs in the rear and side yard with some regulations to protect that.

Chairman Brown asked if this included transfer trucks.

Mr. Williams advised it only pertains to RVs.

Chairman Brown asked if there was anything that allows the parking of transfer trucks in front yards for many days.

Mr. Williams advised staff would have to review UDO; if it is operating in some type of business or something that is not permitted they would be in violation.

Hearing no further discussion, Chairman Brown excused the Planning Board to Room 2029 for deliberations.

Public Hearing - RE: Commissioner Chad Brown - DHHS (ACCESS) - To Request Permission to Apply for NCDOT/PTD FY20 Community Transportation Program (5311) Grant to Provide Rural Public Transportation Services; Enter into an Agreement with the NC Department of Transportation (NCDOT) and Provide the Necessary Assurances and Required Local Match

Chairman Brown introduced Ms. Cheree Wilson, ACCESS Coordinator, for comments.

Ms. Wilson, Access and DHHS - Social Services Division Transportation Coordinator, advised the FY20 Community Transportation Program Grant is a state and federally funded program that is administered by the Public Transportation Division. The Division's goals are to achieve the Coordination Transportation Services definition to support general public transportation in rural North Carolina and provide a coordinated network, enhance access in rural areas to healthcare, shopping, education, employment, public services, recreation and to encourage the most efficient use of transportation funds to provide passenger transportation in rural areas via coordination of programs and services. The County is requesting an administrative grant totaling \$204,160 with an 80% federal, 5% state and 15% local match; the 15% local match totals \$30,624; the administrative grant will be used to fund administrative salaries of Transportation Coordinator, Dispatch Supervisor and Administrative Support Specialist, fringe benefits, travel, training and computer software lease. The County will also apply for an operating grant totaling \$300,000 with a 50% federal and 50% local match of \$150,000 each; this grant will support our operators. drivers and dispatchers salaries. The capital grant totals \$519,655 and is made up of six replacement vehicles (two 22' LTVs, two 25' LTVs, one 28' LTV and one raised roof lift van). Our other capital expenses include advanced technology and baseline technology expenses for the

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replacement of our current two-way radio systems, which dates back to the early 2000s and cameras used in vehicles; the County is asking State to assist with 90% of funding and County to provide a 10% match; the County is requesting a grant to upgrade surveillance (four cameras, a BBR, and hardware to run software) for 28 vehicles that will allow real time GPS and live video for our drivers and passengers to produce evidence to combat any false claims.

Chairman Brown called for citizen comment; hearing none, called for questions from the BOC.

Commissioner Keigher asked what the odds were of not getting these grants.

Ms. Wilson responded the operating which is a new program, would possibly not be awarded; they have a maximum allocation between the administrative and operating; the maximum allocation is being used for the administration; want to start a conversation and get feedback to see if the County could increase the allocation amount or if they will add it as an additional allocation amount.

Commissioner Keigher asked if this was an all or nothing type grant.

Ms. Wilson responded the County receives the capital and administrative grants yearly for reimbursement claims; the likelihood for receiving the new request for the operation grant is slim.

Commissioner Keigher asked if the award amount could be reduced or if the requested amount is typically fully funded.

Ms. Wilson responded based on past trends, the County has received the full amount requested.

Chairman Brown asked if work that is reimbursed is done by the County or an outside agency.

Ms. Wilson responded the state has vendors to select from and staff selected Fortress Mobile for the surveillance; GEMS assisted in acquiring that sole source vendor - no other vendor in area could produce the same product.

Chairman Brown stated he would like staff to use a vendor in the County that can do that same type work if possible.

Hearing no further questions, Chairman Chad Brown called for a motion to approve.

2018-234 Commissioner Chad Brown - DHHS (ACCESS) - To Request Permission to Apply for NCDOT/PTD FY20 Community Transportation Program (5311) Grant to Provide Rural Public Transportation Services; Enter into an Agreement with the NC Department of Transportation (NCDOT) and Provide the Necessary Assurances and Required Local Match

On motion introduced by Commissioner Philbeck and seconded by Commissioner Jack Brown, the BOC unanimously approved **2018-234**.

Commissioner Keigher failed to vote; therefore his vote was cast with the majority.

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<u>Public Hearing - RE: Commissioner Chad Brown - EDC -To Authorize an Economic Development</u> Agreement to Provide a Standard Level One Local Incentive Grant - Project Alpha 3

Chairman Brown introduced Ms. Leslie Hardwick, EDC Project Administrator, for comments.

Ms. Hardwick advised that Project Alpha 3, an international manufacturer and wholesaler of polyurethane systems, has operations in Australia, New Zealand and South Africa and has been importing polyurethane systems in the U.S. for 20 years; they have a partnership with a contract manufacturer in Florida; Gaston County is the only site in NC being considered for this project; the BOC is requested to provide a standard Level One grant for investment years 2018-2022, to accept a \$25,000 Duke Energy Investment Fund Grant on behalf of the company and to apply for the One NC grant for \$50,000 with a \$25,000 County match (County will be the pass-through). Project Alpha 3 proposes to purchase an existing building (former DSM Plant) in Stanley containing 26.16 and 11.43 acres; this is a \$9.2M investment for land; real property investment is \$5.5M and the personal property is \$3.7M; they will employ at least 20 new positions at an average wage of \$60,000, which exceeds the average annual wage of \$38,750 in the County; details of grant will be incorporated into an agreement with the County, Town of Stanley and the company.

Chairman Brown called for citizen comment; hearing none, called for questions from the BOC.

Commissioner Worley asked if the Town of Stanley had voted on this matter.

Ms. Hardwick responded they will vote on it at their next meeting.

Hearing no further questions, Chairman Chad Brown called for a motion to approve the resolution.

2018-235 Commissioner Chad Brown - EDC - To Authorize an Economic Development Agreement to Provide a Standard Level One Local Incentive Grant - Project Alpha 3

On motion introduced by Commissioner Hovis and seconded by Commissioner Philbeck, the BOC unanimously approved **2018-235** as follows:

Chairman Brown introduced Ms. Hardwick for comments.

Ms. Hardwick advised that Project Phoenix, a back office operation, is considering Lowell, NC and plans to invest \$8.3M in real property and \$3M in personal property for a total of \$11.3M over a 5-year period; the company plans to hire 500 employees at an average salary of \$50,000 which exceeds the County's average wage of \$38,750; this will be the largest office project in the County's history; this is the only location being considered in NC; the company is also looking at sites in Texas, Georgia, Tennessee, and South Carolina; the grant stipulates that the company must hire 275 employees before becoming eligible; City of Lowell officials voted and unanimously approved the grant; EDC is requesting BOC to provide a Standard Level Two Grant for years 2019 through 2027 as a local incentive proposal for Project Phoenix.

Chairman Brown recognized the Lowell City Council members in attendance and called for citizen comment.

Mr. Larry Simonds, Lowell, NC, advised that residents of Lowell did not have enough information and spoke in opposition to the approval of providing a tax incentive to a Fortune 500 company when Lowell citizens would also benefit from a tax break; spoke in opposition of the project.

Mr. Ken Erwin, Lowell, NC, advised he retired from the County Police, previously served as Mayor of Lowell for two terms and is currently a Councilmember. He also congratulated County Police Officer Joe Pendergrass on his retirement. He spoke in support of the call center project; the County has tried to attract a call center for several years; this project proposes to bring in several hundred jobs that exceed the average wage in County; the City of Lowell unanimously approved this project at its October meeting and hope the BOC approves the project.

Chairman Brown called for questions from the BOC and none were heard.

Citizen Recognition

Mr. George Stauch, Gastonia, NC, and representative for Gardner Park and Gardner Woods residents, cited the proposed Buster Law that was introduced to the City Council and County Commission; he advised of receiving hundreds of emails from neighbors concerned about their safety; he and his dog were attacked September 23rd by two Akitas that killed his dog. He also cited other attacks by these same dogs; would like a law requiring loose/unleashed dogs that kills another dog or child to be registered as dangerous dogs.

Ms. Demetria Gates, Gastonia, NC, advised residents remain concerned about the irresponsible owner of the Akitas. Residents are committed to insure that Buster's Law has a purpose and neighborhoods remain safe. The Akita was returned to the owner and he took it to his business in Charlotte where it escaped and is running loose; asked if Animal Control is working with Char-Meck Animal Control (C-MAC) on the issue; what other measures will be taken against the pet owner; advised neighbors want to meet with BOC, Animal Control and City Council to address the ordinances.

On motion introduced by Commissioner Keigher and seconded by Commissioner Worley, the BOC unanimously approved **2018-255**, after consideration of the map change application, public hearing comment and Planning Board recommendation:

- 1) The map change request is consistent with the County's approved Comprehensive Plan. The property in question is in a future land use designation of Suburban Development. Suburban Development represents residential development and commercial development to support the residential uses. The rezoning request is from CD/RMF to RMF, meaning if rezoned the property will still be zoned residential. The general area contains mostly residential uses. Additionally, E. Hudson Blvd. bisects the property, making the parcel conducive to more dense commercial development. For these reasons, a rezoning from CD/RMF to RMF is consistent with the comprehensive plan.
 - The Commission considers this action to be reasonable and in the public interest, based on: Planning Board recommendation and compatibility with existing land uses in the immediate area. Property parcel: 139199, be approved, effective with the passage of this Resolution.
- 2) The County Manager is authorized to make necessary notifications in this matter to appropriate parties.

FAILED Commissioner Philbeck - Planning/Development Services - Zoning Map Change: Z18-10, Shelia H. Ballard (Applicant): Property Parcels: 220416 and 165013, Located at 350 and 344 Ballard Rd., Rezone from the (R-1) Single Family Limited Zoning District to the (R-3) Single Family General Zoning District

The County Attorney advised the Planning Board did not recommend approval of the property (24 acres) which is in a future land use designation (rural designated properties) that generally support residential and some commercial activities; the proposed rezoning from R-1 to R-3; rezoning of the subject property in this way keeps the general area in a residential zone and a less restrictive residentially zoned parcel; however, the Planning Board found the request was inconsistent with the Comprehensive Plan because of size of acreage and the request FAILED by a 2-5 vote.

Commissioner Keigher introduced a motion to accept the Planning Board's recommendation to **DISAPPROVE** the rezoning request and Commissioner Philbeck provided the second.

Chairman Brown called for discussion.

Commissioner Worley asked if the Applicant could reapply for the smaller parcel for her relative.

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The County Attorney responded that if he understood the presentation correctly, there could be another subdivision of the site, then a rezoning request from R-1 to R-3; or an R-1 will support the placement of a doublewide.

Commissioner Keigher asked if Applicant would have to pay another application fee to reapply.

The County Attorney advised he will find out the answer and that the Planning Board may still be in session so the Applicant could return to that meeting.

Commissioner Keigher asked the County Manager to make sure that staff remains at meeting until these items are completed.

Chairman Brown called for the vote to **DISSAPPROVE** the rezoning request which carried unanimously.

2018-258 Commissioner Worley - Sheriff's Office - Appropriation of Additional Funds to House Inmates Out of County for August and September 2018 (\$112,483)

Commissioner Philbeck introduced the motion to approve and Commissioner Keigher provided the second.

Chairman Brown called for discussion.

Commissioner Worley stated that the County is paying another \$112,483 bill due to its limited jail capacity; he would like to have a monthly update added to the Agenda for continuing projects (jail infill, animal shelter, other ongoing projects); BOC does not get sufficient information about the status of these projects; have heard that progress is being made on the jail infill and the plans are there, but how long will it be before construction gets underway; these payments could be used to service the debt of the infill project.

The County Manager advised that staff has a complete design for the infill project which has been approved by the City of Gastonia; currently the design is with the State and County anticipates its expedited approval; staff will then move forward with the bid process to get a contractor for the project; anticipate the construction process for the modular units will take nine to twelve months to complete; staff has seen some fluctuation in the number of inmates; had 605 on site this morning; hope to abate that as we move further into winter; realistically expects the County will have to make more payments for housing inmates out-of-county.

Commissioner Jack Brown recalled when the Marshal Plan was initiated to incarcerate federal prisoners that the County hired 14 deputies to house inmates under that plan; the County had to have 30 inmates/day to cover the cost of those 14 deputies; the County is not covering its cost for the current 20 inmates; could best use those beds for the prisoners being transported to other counties; suggested ending the Marshal Plan if the County is losing money.

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The County Manager advised the County is currently housing 33 federal inmates (21 Marshals; 12 Bureau of Prisons inmates); have run these numbers before and always came out ahead by continuing to take federal inmates - assuming it does not have to transport the inmates too far which would involve variable cost factors; still believe it's a good idea to have the federal inmate program; once the County gains additional beds via the infill project and additional jail wing, the relationship with the federal agencies will continue to be a valuable revenue stream; don't want to jeopardize that relationship by curtailing it at this time.

Commissioner Jack Brown questioned where the number 33 came from.

The County Manager responded according to the information he received this morning it was 21 Marshals and 12 Bureau of Prisons.

Commissioner Jack Brown advised that the original plan only involved the Marshal's plan and nothing else.

The County Manager responded he did not have all of the history of the original plan.

Commissioner Jack Brown asked the County Manager to check into that.

The County Manager advised he was certain the County has a formal agreement with the Bureau of Prisons.

Commissioner Philbeck stated it would be helpful if staff provided the actual cost of the program, instead of just the inmate population and transport numbers; currently the BOC is being told the program pays for itself; think Commissioner Jack Brown wants to see the numbers.

The County Manager advised that staff would run the numbers.

Chairman Brown advised that Chief Deputy Griffin has been sending him the numbers and he may be at fault by not sharing those with BOC.

Commissioner Hovis advised the County needs to start looking into preliminary plans and begin working with the City of Gastonia to put the property to the rear of the jail in a buildable situation for future construction; would like for County Manager to report these monthly cost projections at the November meeting and to amend the current budget to encumber \$120k/month for inmate transport for the remainder of budget year.

Chairman Brown called for the vote, and the BOC unanimously approved **2018-258**. and per Budget Change Request:
